# 2. Ministry of Health Weekly Report



## 2.1 Policy/Programme Updates

# 2.1.1 COVID-19, Operational Determination for Use of N95/P2 Particulate Respirators across Managed Isolation and Quarantine Facilities

The Ministry of Health and the All-of-Government response team to COVID-19 have identified additional infection protection control (IPC) strategies to further prevent transmission to our border workforce and Managed Isolation and Quarantine Facility (MIQF) guests. Key factors that prompted the additional measures are outlined below:

- The emergence of the higher transmissible COVID-19 strains first identified in the United Kingdom and South Africa.
- The need for increased protection of staff working in MIQF when close contact in confined spaces with returnees is unavoidable.
- Increased localised supply of N95/P2 particulate respirators to some MIQFs, indicating variations in use between facilities.
- Growing evidence of the ability of this virus to potentially transmit to others via aerosolised particles.

Additional IPC strategies that have been implemented in response to these issues are:

- As at 3 February 2021, MIQF staff (including healthcare workers, drivers and those escorting guests) who are unable to maintain physical distance from returnees are now advised to wear N95/P2 respirators.
- PPE will now be directly supplied to MIQFs from the Ministry of Health's central supply, rather
  than from DHBs. This provides a standardised platform to monitor use and access to verified
  and agreed PPE by MIQF workers. The transition period started on 8 February 2021 and is
  scheduled to be completed by 19 February 2021.

#### **Next steps**

The Ministry of Health is reviewing maritime IPC guidance which is progressing through final approvals. The Ministry will provide you with an update when this review is complete, which we expect to be next week.

The Ministry of Health will continue to monitor MIQF PPE requirements and use.

2.1.2 COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme

#### Pfizer vaccine arrival

On 15 February 2021 the Pfizer vaccine arrived in New Zealand from Brussels via Singapore and is now the property of the New Zealand Government. The shipment of vaccines was delivered to the HCL storage facility and quality assurance checks were carried out on the vaccine to ensure there had been no variations to temperature. HCL is now preparing the vaccine for distribution to district health boards. Consumables have arrived into New Zealand that will allow vaccinators to administer the vaccine. There are currently enough consumables to cover the first four weeks of vaccine rollout, and we are expecting additional consumables on 22 February 2021, which provide for vaccine delivery until May 2021. Officials have managed to secure 490,000 LDS needles, which will enable vaccinators to draw six doses per vial (rather than the current five) are expected to arrive in New Zealand on 20 February 2021.

#### Vaccinator workforce training

Vaccinator training is fully operational and as of 17 February 2021, 123 vaccinators and 79 administrators have completed the training, with a further 200 vaccinators and 80 administrators underway. Once vaccinators have completed their training, they can be loaded into the COVID-19 immunisation register.

#### Dry run events

Further to the walkthrough event last week, additional dry run sessions have taken place this week with delivery partners to ensure we are well prepared for the first vaccine delivery on 20 February 2021. Two dry run sessions have been undertaken:

- Distribution dry run (16 February 2021) involved shipping consumables and an empty-vaccine container to a MIQ facility, as well as an audit of the HCL storage facility to maintain vaccine integrity.
- End to end dry run (17 February 2021) the Ministry of Health worked closely with some of the first DHBs involved in the roll out to run through a "day in the life" of vaccine delivery, including various scenarios and potential stumbling blocks.

#### Niue One-way Quarantine Free Travel: Update

#### s7(b)(iii)

Agencies have been considering detailed information on Niue's border settings and health system to fully understand these systems and also to determine whether an in-person technical visit to Niue is required to provide the necessary assurances for commencement of one-way quarantine-free travel.

A key consideration is that Niue intends to maintain its current border settings under one-way quarantine-free travel from Niue to New Zealand. Currently Niue's air border is closed to all arrivals except a weekly flight from New Zealand and the maritime border is closed to all vessels except for scheduled commercial cargo vessels.

On the basis of the information gathered through remote means and by the High Commission in Niue, New Zealand agencies are forming a general sense that a technical visit to Niue may not be needed to provide assurance to Ministers that it is safe to proceed with one-way quarantine-free travel. An in-person technical visit will still be needed prior to commencement of two-way quarantine-free travel.

You will receive a submission in the coming days detailing proposed next steps towards one-way quarantine-free travel and seeking your views. Should you agree to the recommendations in the submission, officials will prepare advice for you to take to Cabinet on 8 March 2021 for consideration of one-way quarantine-free entry from Niue to New Zealand, with a view to commencing quarantine-free entry in mid to late-March 2021. Officials have already briefed Air New Zealand and Auckland Airport in confidence, and initial indications show they will be able to facilitate quarantine-free entry from Niue within the indicated timeframes.

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# 3. Managed Isolation and Quarantine Weekly Report



#### 3.1 Top Items to Note

#### 3.1.1 Pullman Reopening

- We have begun to reoccupy the Pullman Managed Isolation Facility this week. On Tuesday,
   98 returnees (in 62 rooms) arrived and on Wednesday 122 returnees (in 90 rooms) arrived.
- The installation of the air filtration systems in the lifts is complete.
- We plan to reoccupy the Pullman to complete capacity from 6 March 2021 at the earliest
  unless returnees are required to be accommodated there due to unplanned circumstances
  e.g. a domestic transfer flight gets turned back to Auckland.

#### 3.1.2 Vaccinations update

- The vaccination of the border and MIQ workforce is expected to start from Saturday 20 February 2021.
- MIQ RIQ Leads are working closely with DHBs on the detailed planning of the rollout to our MIQ workforce.
- Ministry of Health are providing communication collateral for distribution to the workforce with information about the vaccination and its rollout.
- Stakeholder engagement is occurring as needed (e.g. unions and hotels).

#### 3.1.3 MIAS release

- Room release occurred on 17 February 2021 for the period 19 February to 3 March 2021.
- We will release 20 rooms a day, totalling 260 rooms across the period.
- Further release for April and May 2021 to occur next.

#### 3.1.4 Capacity

- This week, there were three issues that required us to utilise our contingency. This included:
  - A planned transfer from Auckland to Wellington was cancelled because the originating flight out of Australia was delayed. Therefore, the transfer could not get into Wellington until after the runway was closed. This required the returnees to be located in an Auckland MIF at short notice;
  - A flight arriving from Brisbane in Auckland was cancelled due to the suspension of safe travel with Australia. This was being re-tasked to complete a transfer to Christchurch. The new timing conflicted with the deportee flight which arrived on 17 February 2021 and used the same gate at Auckland airport as the domestic transfers. Therefore this transfer is also cancelled and the returnees will need to be located in an Auckland MIF.
- These occurrences, on the back of utilising contingency whilst the Pullman was closed, highlight the few options available to move capacity between regions, requiring Auckland (and to some extent Hamilton and Rotorua) to maintain a resilient level of contingency rooms.

#### 3.1.5 Security Enhancement Programme Update

#### **CCTV and Associated Technologies Roll-out**

• 21 sites are complete, and 11 sites are in the process of being implemented.

- Work is complete at the Pullman Hotel installation of CCTV and associated technologies completed on 14 February 2021.
- All remaining sites remain on track to be complete by late February mid-March 2021, subject to reliability on the delivery of equipment from overseas and accessibility to sites.

#### **MIQ Security Personnel Transition to MBIE Security Workforce**

- Work continues to reduce MBIE's reliance on contracted security personnel by standing up an MBIE security workforce.
- Four Operations and Security Managers (3 x Rotorua and 1 x Hamilton based sites) commenced week of 15 February 2021. Offers for remaining Operations and Security Manager positions have been sent to successful candidates.
- Interviews for Wellington based MIQ Security Officers were completed week of 9 February 2021. Offers are dependent on Union discussions and AVSEC Payroll as a Service arrangements (see below).
- Work with AVSEC to provide a rostering and payroll solution is progressing well and indications
  are this solution should be in place mid-March 2021 to support administering MBIE's relatively
  large, 24/7, rostered security workforce.
- All 32 independent site security assessments from security consultancy firm ICARAS have been received. Analysis is underway to consider the findings in these reports with specific focus on the MBIE Security Workforce numbers and locations.

#### 3.1.6 Iwi engagement and Maori Partnership model

- MIQ is developing an MIQ-Māori partnership model work stream. The aim is to:
  - to identify opportunities to strengthen MIQ's partnership with Iwi and Māori, acknowledge the mana of Māori and their status as a Treaty partner and to improve MIQ practice and policy, and
  - prioritise building an engagement platform with Māori, where critical issues concerning MIQ and potentially the Government's wider COVID-19 work can be addressed.
- We will be seeking direction from you on your preference for involvement.
- The proposed work streams include
  - Partnership and engagement;
  - Impact of MIQ on Māori;
  - Cultural responsiveness and inclusiveness;
  - Active protection and equity.
- Engagement this week has included:
  - Head and Deputy Secretary MIQ with Ngāti Whatua Orakei (Auckland 11 Feb). First engagement between two entities. Culminated in joint opening ceremony of Pullman.
  - Deputy Secretary and GM Operations MIQ with Te Arawa (Rotorua 18 Feb). Ongoing engagement.

# 3.3 Large Group Arrivals Update

#### **Current and incoming sports teams**

The English Women's cricket team departed MIQ successfully on 9 February 2021. The Australian men's cricket team are successfully training offsite with no significant issues or disruptive behaviour to date. The Australian Diamonds netball team arrived on Monday 15 February 2021 via Charter into Christchurch. The exemption for Bangladesh has been approved by the Minister.

#### Tokyo 2021 Olympic and Paralympic Games

The two Games have been rescheduled to now take place in July and August, and August and September 2021 respectively. MIQ has been working directly with Sport New Zealand, who are the lead agency for the Games. They have advised that the Minister for Sport and Recreation has requested that work be done to develop a triaged, prioritised, and 'most likely' package of travel necessary.

Sport NZ have advised that their initial assessment has identified a total delegation of 530 people as likely for the Olympic Games and a total delegation of 100 people as likely for the Paralympic Games. The return from each Games, necessary qualification and pre-Games competition travel for each delegation will generate a significant demand for MIQ places. \$9(2)(g)(i)

Options are also being explored to develop a phased approach to delegations returns from Japan, including potentially holding athletes in Japan after the Games to support this. MIQ are meeting regularly with Sport New Zealand to stay across the options and final numbers.

#### Recognised Seasonal Employment (RSE) Arrivals

The last group of RSE workers (155 pax) left MIQ on 17 February 2021. The latest group of workers (155 pax) arrived on 18 February 2021 from Vanuatu and Fiji. Planning had already been in motion for a possible regional lockdown and information has been provided to the industry to support the transfer of employees during the Alert Level 3 lockdown in Auckland. While ARIQCC are managing the continuous in and out flow of workers, this group continues to provide a number of complex challenges for the ARIQCC given the high rates of non-English speakers (almost 100%) and smokers (approximately 80% on average).

#### Recognised Seasonal Employment (RSE) Arrivals

The Public health Risk assessment for the first group who are all coming from Malaysia has been released. Language barriers and translation, coupled with possible higher medical and/or welfare needs will be key risks and will require additional wraparound support. While the cohorts are small, there are a number of languages spoken, some of which are niche. Translation services will be provided on the ground (including Ezispeak and in-person translators), as well as translated welcome packs. MIQ are working with the Mangere Refugee Resettlement Centre to understand the group's needs and share services. The Centre will also have a presence onsite at the MIF during check-in and for first few days. They will act as liaisons for refugees, and interface between refugees and MIF staff where required.

  has been resolved.
- Invoices are due 90 days from the date on the invoice and are sent 'per room'.

#### 3.6.1 Approvals by Category

- New categories came into force after 10am 04 Dec 2020 and all cases were accessed in CMS after the week beginning 14 Dec 2020.

Chart 1: 65% of Applications were approved under 2e and 1a

The pie chart represents the total breakdown of **approvals** by the different categories within emergency allocation from **21 December 2020 to 15 January 2021**. At the current stage, MIQ can only provide information relating to categories for the time period after the move to CMS.

#### **Emergency allocation categories:**

- 1a NZ citizen or resident with serious risk to health
- 1b To provide care and protection to a child
- 2a NZ citizen or resident to provide critical care for a dependant
- 2b Critical worker for delivering a critical public or health service
- 2c NZ citizen or resident unable to legally remain in their current location
- 2d Travel required for National security, interest or law enforcement reasons
- 2e NZ citizen or resident to visit a close relative who is dying





Chart 2: Category 2e and 1a continue to be the most prevalent for applications and approvals.

- Average number of complaints received each week since the start of MIQ is 107. For the last 4 weeks the average is 166 per week.
- The oldest non ombudsman complaint in the system is from 23 January 2021 (we are waiting for information from MoH to respond), and all complaints outside of our 5 working day KPI are being actively worked on.
- The major complaint type this week continues to be the Allocation System (56 out of 109), although the number of complaints has dropped by nearly half this week. The themes remain the same; the availability of vouchers and the confusing error message when a date is booked by another user.



# 4. Border Executive Board Report



## 4.1 Key issues being considered by the Executive Board

#### 4.1.1 Vaccination of the border workforce

- The Border Executive Board has established a Border Sector Vaccination Coordination Group (BSVCG), embedded in the Ministry of Health, with staff from MBIE, Customs and other agencies. It is led by Andrew Milne (MBIE). Within the overall vaccination programme established by the Ministry of Health, its role is to coordinate the implementation of the vaccination programme across the border sector, including MIQ and industry.
  - The BSVCG will ensure there is a consistent approach across agencies and that there
    is a high level of information provided to border workers about the vaccine and its roll
    out.
  - Vaccination will commence from Saturday 20 February 2021 with the Jet Park Quarantine facility, and then expand from there across the Auckland, Wellington, Bay of Plenty, Waikato, and Canterbury regions from 22-27 February.
  - Vaccination reporting measures and the means by which vaccination will be passed on to employers for reporting purposes are still under development.

#### 4.1.2 Impact of COVID-19 on border and transport agencies

- A suite of papers are expected to be considered by Cabinet Economic Development Committee on 24 February 2021. These papers relate to the financial sustainability of border and transport agencies following reduced third party revenue from international passenger fees, and cost recovery options. The papers also canvas options for the restart of cost recovery across the border and transport agencies, which could help offset the financial impacts of the loss of third party revenue.
- The information and the financial forecasts in these papers are based on scenarios prepared in September 2020 about the recovery of passenger volumes.
- Officials are currently updating the scenarios. There is considerable uncertainty about passenger volumes, with a key assumption underpinning the volumes being when safe travel zones will become operational and stable. This is particularly volatile.
- Because of this uncertainty, the Executive Board proposes that the scenarios prepared in September continue to be used by agencies for the forthcoming cabinet papers. The updated scenarios – once confirmed – will be used to update Budget 21 proposals.

# 5.1 Items to Note/Updates

#### 5.1.1 Maritime Border

 Since the Maritime Border Order came into effect on 30 June 2020 a total of 86 small craft have arrived in New Zealand. As the small craft arrival season draws to an end, the number of arrivals has decreased significantly with only one superyacht currently in isolation at Opua.

#### 5.1.2 Pre-Departure Testing

- For the period 8 February 2021 to 14 February 2021, there were no infringements issued and two warnings were issued as follows:
  - 10 February PDT Certificate did not have the specific test type stated, but had other test details and all other data points.
  - 11 February PDT Certificate did not have a Date of Birth or Passport Number stated but had other test details and all other data points.
