Report on Overseas Travel: Rt Hon Christopher Luxon and Hon Todd McClay – Japan, 16-20 June 2024

I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel with Hon Todd McClay to Japan, from Sunday 16 June to Thursday 20 June.

Report

- In our reset of New Zealand's foreign policy, we agreed to significantly increase our focus on and resources applied to Asia, including Japan.
- Japan lives in a difficult neighbourhood, adjacent s6(a)

 Russia (a country with which it has a territorial dispute) and North Korea (which regularly launches ballistic missile tests over Japan). A US Ally, Japan lies at the heart of the emerging latticework of Indo-Pacific security cooperation, including the Quad and the US-Japan-ROK trilateral. s6(a)
- Economically, Japan is the world's fourth largest economy and our fourth largest export destination and fourth largest source of foreign direct investment. Traditionally, a premium market, Japan is important to our primary exporters, as well as tourism and education suppliers. As we look to diversify exports and grow foreign investment, this is a key market on which we should focus efforts.
- 4 Against that background, the objectives of this trip were achieved by:
 - 4.1 Deepening the relationship. In addition to Prime Minister Kishida, I connected with 15 Members of Parliament, including a former Prime Minister, the serving Defence Minister and his deputy. s6(a)

We also demonstrated to the Japanese that New Zealand is relevant to their strategic circumstances by (i) concluding the Information Sharing Agreement; and (ii) announcing our enhanced NZDF deployment intended to detect and deter North Korea's sanctions evasion activities.

- Reinvigorating core economic interests. With elements of our trade relationship not having recovered from COVID (e.g. tourism at 60% of 2019 numbers), we worked with the 29-strong business delegation to promote opportunities in our traditional markets: food and beverage, tourism and education. We also met with longstanding investors in the New Zealand forestry and fisheries sector, providing them assurance that the Government values the partnership with them.
- 4.3 Leveraging emerging opportunities. With Japan a major source of innovation, this mission had a focus on new opportunities. For example, we promoted New Zealand's space industry, connected with renewable energy investors, and profiled rugby as an emergent commercial opportunity. As well as

announcing some new investment deals, we encouraged major institutional investors to take another look at New Zealand's potential.

Two themes stuck out in Japan. First, I was reminded again of the importance of committing for the long-term to enduring relationships. Japan is a key market for many New Zealand businesses, with it important that they sustain a presence in the market so they can evolve their offering better to take advantage of new opportunities in a country of 120 million people. The same applies to our government-to-government relationship, with it important that we continue to recommit to and modernise a relationship with a G7 country that sits at the absolute heart of the emerging Indo-Pacific architecture.

9 With our aircraft having a planned refuelling stop in Port Moresby, Prime Minister Marape and his Foreign, Trade and Agriculture Ministers were all kind enough to come and meet Minister McClay and I at the airport. In our discussions, three themes came to the fore.
