

TARGET DELIVERY ACTIONS

The Government has achieved a 34% reduction between December and June. This positive trend has continued, as recent July data shows Emergency Housing significantly reduced to 1,707 households.

The Government is focused on:

- Improving pathways out of emergency housing. The Priority One Fast Track
 established in April is working, getting more families with children out of
 emergency housing into social housing. Based on April data, 76% of households
 transitioned into private rental, social, and transitional housing.
- Reducing demand and ensuring it is only used when necessary: Tightening
 the gateway into Emergency Housing has resulted in reductions and ensured
 people are supported to access and sustain stable accommodation through help
 from Housing Brokers, and Emergency Housing Support Services (funded in
 Budget 2024 for a further two years).
- Increasing the supply of suitable housing and maximising the impact of existing supply. This includes 1,500 social housing places (2025-2027) funded through Budget 2024.
- Going for Housing Growth programme to address the underlying causes of the housing supply shortage.
