

## **TARGET DELIVERY ACTIONS**

The Government is committed to providing timely, high-quality healthcare for all New Zealanders. Results declined since the last quarterly report as expected due to winter illness leading to more people presenting to emergency departments and staying longer in hospital.

**Patient demand is increasing.** There were 18,000 more patients presenting to emergency departments compared with the same quarter in the prior year. Despite increased demand, results for this quarter are consistent with the same quarter in the prior year.

**The Minister of Health** is focused on driving action to ensure that all New Zealanders have access to timely high-quality healthcare. Improvements across the whole system of care are needed to reduce the unacceptable wait times at emergency departments.

The Minister of Health recently announced priorities for making immediate improvements to the delivery of public health services. This includes actions to:

- Stabilise Health NZ's governance and accountability arrangements to allow the organisation to get back to basics on delivering for New Zealanders.
- Enable primary care to treat more patients in the community by investing in core general
  practice services to provide faster and more flexible access, providing better digital access
  to 24/7 primary care, increasing and retaining doctors in primary care, and increasing
  primary care nurses.
